

You are doing things backwards if you pick out a house before you know where it will be placed and how it will face.

Even when you intend to remodel, keep the old house and its location out of mind until you decide the best location and the best plan arrangement. You will be surprised how this method will help you decide what to do with the old home.

First set up a definite goal.

Next, make a plan.

When you know what you want, it's much easier to get it.


DO THINGS IN THEIR PROPER ORDER


1.	Start	with	your	farmstead	as	it is	5.

- 2. Find the best location for the farmhouse.
- 3. Fit the farmhouse to the farmstead.

1.	Draw in the highway.
2.	Show where prevailing winds come from.

5.	Now you are ready to place the drive.

THE BIG THREE


In many ways a farmhouse is like any livable house,

BUT

There are THREE things that make a farmhouse DIFFERENT.


- 1. THE FRONT DOOR FACING THE DRIVE, or so arranged that visitors will come to the front door.
- 2. A CENTRAL HALL placed so that all rooms, (including basement and second floor, if a part of your house), can be reached from the rear door. That is the door the family will use all day long every day.
- 3. A WORK ROOM for the heavy and dirty work in order to make that work easier. It should be on the first floor not far from the kitchen. Experience shows that it is used almost every hour of the day.


THE CENTRAL HALL



It is important that this hall connect with all rooms. It is not so important that it connect with the front entrance. It is not always possible to get all these things into one plan; but the more you can work in, the better your plan will be for FARM use.

Let's try an entirely different farmstoad. That should be helpful, because no two farmsteads are exactly alike.
