
These are good cleaners:

Chlorine bleach
Pine 'O Pine
Rocal
or
1/4 cup kerosene mixed
with 1 cup of baking soda.



Let cleaner soak in toilet about 5 minutes—then rub the inside with a long—handled brush and flush.

CAUTION: Chlorine bleaches mixed with ammonia, lye, vinegar, toilet bowl cleaners or other cleaners form a poisonous gas.



Each person should help by leaving the bathroom as clean as he found it.

Long-handled brush Cloths or sponge

USE THESE SUPPLIES AS THEY CLEAN AND KILL HOUSEHOLD GERMS
