



Cleaning Upholstery, Mattresses *and* Rugs




Sweep the dust off furniture,
mattress or rug.

Put in a large bowl:
1/4 cup of the kind of detergent
you use for washing clothes.
3/4 cup cool water.
1 tablespoon ammonia (if very
dirty); with egg beater or sponge
beat-up a stiff foam of suds.



You can clean upholstered
furniture, rugs and
mattresses the same way.



Rub the suds on a small area of
the furniture with a sponge, stiff
brush or cloth.

Try to keep the padding
inside the furniture from
becoming soaking-wet.



Rinse off with a clean, damp cloth.
Change rinse water often; continue
cleaning small areas until the chair
is done.

Let dry 3-4 hours before using.
When dry, brush with a whisk
broom.

USE THESE TOOLS:

2 large bowls
Sponges or cloths
Whisk broom

USE THESE SUPPLIES:

Cool water
Ammonia
Laundry-type soap or
detergent such as:
Clear, Fab, Oxydol,
Rinso, Tide or Wisk.

Use about 1/4 cup to 3/4
cup of water.
