AFRO-SCHOLAR EDITORIAL

The key mandate for Afro-American Studies is "Academic Excellence and Social Responsibility." As the Director of the Afro-American Studies Program at the University of Illinois, it is my responsibility to comment on the current Mayoral campaign in Chicago. This campaign has revealed the ugly cancer of racism more vividly than any thing since the civil rights marches in the South, or into Cicero, Illinois.

White racism continues to be part of the American scene. It has become clear that while Chicago has had a Democratic Mayor for over 50 years, whites are likely to cross over to the Republican ticket in the 1983 general election because their party has elected a Black man in the Democratic primary. Whatever the results of the general election, the character of this racism must be understood.

It is in this context that we continue to hear questions like, "Why do we need Black Studies?" "Talking about Martin Luther King and Malcolm X sounds too much like the 1960s." "Get with it, we have overcome!" "I am not against a Black person as long as they are qualified." "Black Studies is for Black people." "There is no need for white people to take Black Studies courses."

We need Black Studies as long as white racism is rampant in society and threatens to tear our cities apart. We need to systematically study the ideas and social practice of both Martin and Malcolm to understand the possibility of fundamental change in the USA. We, as Blacks and whites, have not overcome the evil of racism, and therefore, we continue to survive a barbaric level of culture and social development. The issue is no longer the qualification of Blacks, but the political backwardness of whites who allow racism to control decision-making. Black Studies has to be for everybody.

If racism dominates an election, then democracy does not exist. The prerequisite for a democracy is not only the governmental structure of universal suffrage, but an enlightened electorate. Racism only thrives in ignorance, and always liquidates democracy whenever it gets the chance. How many chances does America have left?

John Stewart (Associate Professor of Anthropology, University of Illinois) is President of the Association of Black Anthropologists and former Director of the Afro-American Studies and Research Program.

STUDENT ACTIVITIES

Black Music Lives!

The University of Illinois at Urbana's first Black radio station, WBML, went on a few months ago, catering to the needs and wants of University of Illinois' Black Student population. The organization of the station was a result of controversy over the amount of Black programming on the University of Illinois' WPGU last spring. "We felt that we were not being well-represented," said Alicia Banks, WBML's general manager and operations coordinator. "We are a minority but they (WPGU) should let the degree they represent us be a fair one. We decided it would be nice to be part of or have something of our own." WBML, which stands for Black Music Lives, hopes to eventually become Champaign-Urbana's first Black FM Community Commercial station. Similar issues have emerged at Northwestern, Northern Illinois, and on other campuses. (Originally reported in Drumbeat!, newsletter of Loyola University of Chicago's Afro-American Studies Program.)

Seminar on Black Leadership

A group of about a dozen undergraduate students have been meeting throughout the 1982-83 academic year in a weekly seminar with Professor McWorter. The seminar focuses on the Black (and Latino) community and leadership, with particular reference to Chicago. Activities in this seminar are directly related to our "Chicago: The Crisis of Leadership" lecture series. (Students read background material and prepare questions prior to the appearance of each lecturer, send a follow-up letter to the speaker after he or she leaves, etc.) Next year, these activities will continue under AFRO 298B: Black Chicago and Leadership. We are currently working to develop a summer internship program that would place some of these students, and others, in various key Chicago agencies.

Proposal for Statewide Graduate Program

In cooperation with a number of other Illinois institutions, the Afro-American Studies and Research Program has submitted a proposal to the Illinois Board of Higher Education to develop a Cooperative Graduate Program in Afro-American Studies. The Program, which would be administratively based at the University of Illinois-Urbana, would be directed toward:

1. Full-time students already enrolled in graduate programs who desire to pursue supplementary courses in Afro-American Studies.
2. Potential students whose career preparation and advancement can be enhanced through pursuing graduate study on a part-time basis (e.g., public school teachers in the humanities and social sciences).
3. Citizens whose professional work and/or personal development goals lead them to pursue graduate level study as an important insight into human relations/race relations (e.g., working journalists, public agency employees, law enforcement staff, etc.).
4. New students who plan to enroll full-time in graduate study whose career objectives can be met by pursuing a graduate degree in Afro-American Studies.

INTERNATIONAL STUDY/TRAVEL

Jamaica

Two separate travel/study programs of three weeks each in Jamaica will be based at the University of the West Indies (Mona) campus. (Group 1: June 28-July 19;

Group 2: July 20-Aug 11.) The programs are interdisciplinary, covering historical, political, socioeconomic and cultural themes. They are being directed by Dr. Locksley Edmondson (a Jamaican and former Dean of Social Sciences at the UWI) through the administrative channels of the Division of Continuing Education at Southern Illinois University at Carbondale (SIU-C). Each program includes a similar offering of lectures and discussions involving West Indian academicians and professionals; site visits and tours of historical, socio-economic and cultural significance and numerous other opportunities to gain firsthand experience of a Caribbean country in transition.

Open to undergraduate and graduate students from any discipline and to other interested persons. Each group will be limited to minimum of 12 and a maximum of 20 participants. Four credit hours at the 400-level can be earned from SIU-C (Black American Studies Seminar).

The cost (subject to change) of the land portion of each 21-day program in Jamaica is \$934, including lodging at UWI dormitories (single room without meals); organized field trips outside the Kingston; airport transfer; honoraria; instructor's expenses; health insurance; tuition/supervision costs; promotional expenses. It does not include meals (3 available at the lodging facility for \$8.00 daily); travel within the Kingston area (relatively inexpensive local buses and taxis); and a \$73 contingency fee (completely refundable at the conclusion of the tour). Round-trip air fares and bookings will be handled by a predetermined travel agent (costs approximately \$354 from St. Louis; \$340 from Chicago; \$230 from Miami).
