


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Hanging Out The Wash



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Hanging Out The Wash

- 1. Hang clothes on lines located near the laundry area to save steps and time.
- 2. Save energy when hanging out clothes by placing basket on a laundry cart or child's wagon.
- 3. Keep clothes pins within easy reach by using an apron with pockets or a bag which will hang on the line.
- 4. Hang cup towels, towels, pillow cases, table cloths, etc., one-third over the line to avoid dog-eared corners.
- 5. Hang sheets and table cloths doubled with hems together one-third over the line.
- 6. Handkerchiefs and napkins can be grouped to save space and hung over the line like other flat pieces—never by one corner.
- 7. Hang shirts by their tails.
- 8. Hang dresses, blouses, gowns, and pajama tops by the shoulder seams.
- 9. Hang trousers, shorts, and pajama bottoms by the waist. To make ironing pants easier, pants stretchers may be used.
- 10. Hang slips by the underarm section.

Fold flat clothes as they are taken from the line to reduce wrinkles. Place in basket on laundry cart or child's wagon.

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
