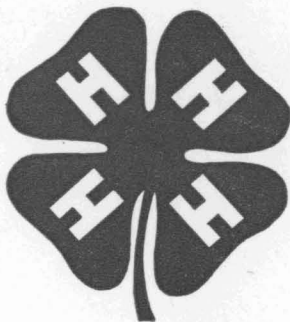

4-H Colors—Green and White.

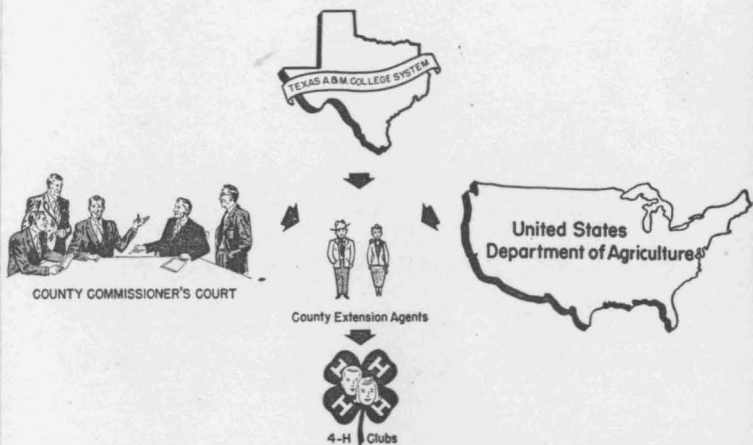
4-H PRAYER

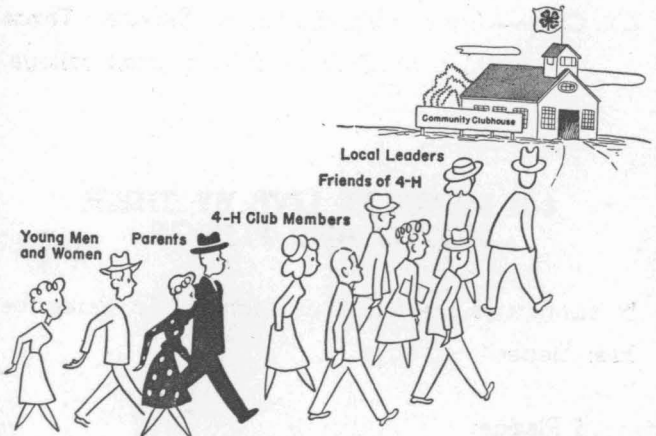
